# Details

The HSL color  $0^\circ, 0\%, 0\%$  is a dark color, and the **websafe** version is hex `000000`, and the color name is **black**. A complement of this color would be  $180^\circ, 0\%, 0\%$ , and the grayscale version is  $0^\circ, 0\%, 0\%$ .

A 20% lighter version of the original color is  $0^\circ, 0\%, 19\%$ , and  $0^\circ, 0\%, 0\%$  is the 20% darker color. If you saturate the color by 10%, you get  $0^\circ, 0\%, 0\%$ , and if you desaturate by 10%, it is  $0^\circ, 0\%, 0\%$ .

# Brightness & Saturation Gradients

These gradients show how the HSL color 180°, 0%, 0% changes by changing the brightness by 10 percent. The first figure shows a shift by +10% for each color and the second figure -10%.

Similar to the brightness gradients but the following saturation gradients show a change of the HSL color 180°, 0%, 0% by changing the saturation by 10% instead.

# Harmonies

# Split Complementary

Split-complementary colors differ from the complementary color scheme. The scheme consists of three colors, the original color and two neighbors of the complement color.

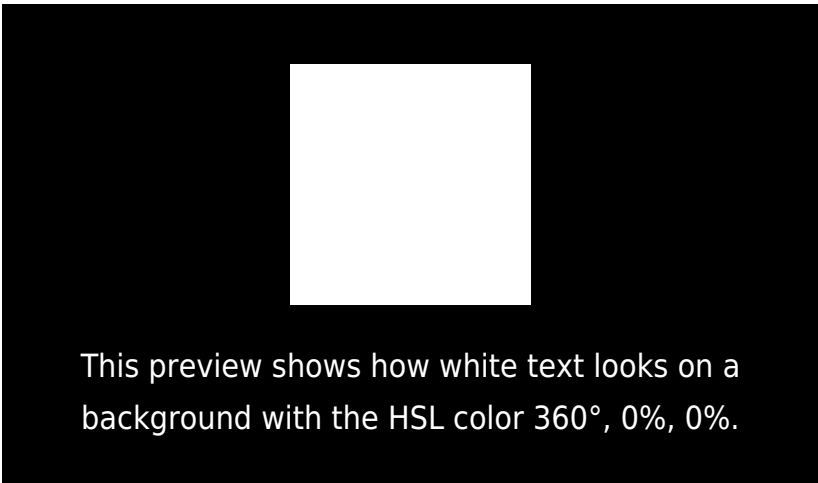
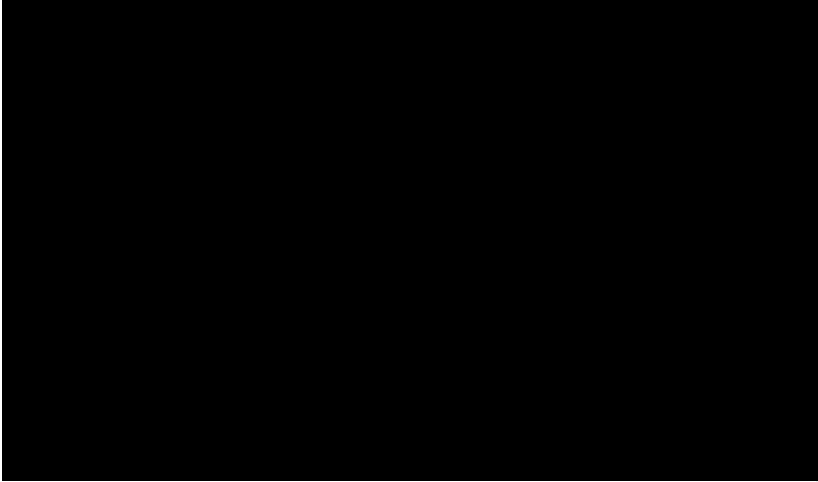

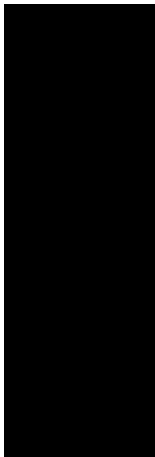




# Color Blindness Simulation



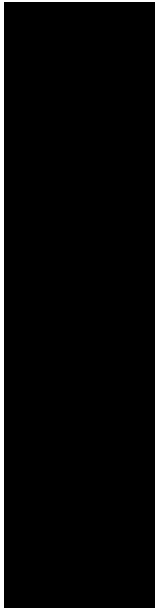

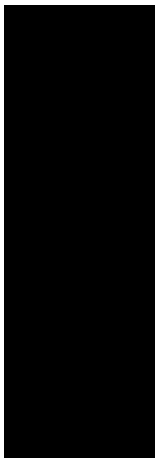

# CSS Examples

## Text

The CSS property to change the color of the text to HSL 360°, 0%, 0% is called "color". The color property can be set on classes, ids or directly on the HTML element.

This example shows how text in the color hsl(360, 0%, 0%) looks like.

```
.text, #text, p{  
    color:hsl(360, 0%, 0%)  
}
```

If you want to add a text shadow in that color use the text-shadow property, you can generate a text shadow directly with our [CSS Text Shadow Generator](#).

Here you see how black text with a 4 pixel hsl(360, 0%, 0%) colored shadow looks like.

```
.shadow{ text-shadow: 4px 4px 2px hsl(360, 0%, 0%) }
```

## Border

The CSS property to change the border of an element to HSL 360°, 0%, 0% is called "border". The border property can be set on classes, ids or directly on the HTML element.

This example shows the color as border, it can be applied via the CSS property "border" or "border-color".

```
.border, #border, table{ border:4px solid hsl(360, 0%, 0%) }
```

If only the border color should be changed use the property border-color.

```
.border{ border-color:hsl(360, 0%, 0%) }
```

If you want to add a box shadow in that color use:

Here you see how a box with a 4 pixel hsl(360, 0%, 0%) colored shadow looks like.

```
.boxshadow{ -moz-box-shadow:4px 4px 4px  
4px hsl(360, 0%, 0%); -webkit-box-  
shadow:4px 4px 4px 4px hsl(360, 0%, 0%);  
box-shadow:4px 4px 4px 4px hsl(360, 0%,  
0%) }
```

# Background

The CSS property to change the background color of an element to HSL 360°, 0%, 0% is called "background". The background property can be set on classes, ids or directly on the HTML element.

```
.background, #background, body{  
background:hsl(360, 0%, 0%) }
```

If only the background color should be changed can be used:

```
.background{ background-color:hsl(360, 0%,  
0%) }
```

This example shows the color as background, it is applied via the CSS property "background".
