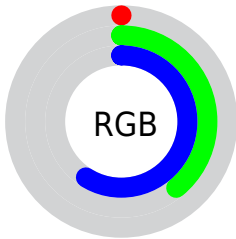

# Details

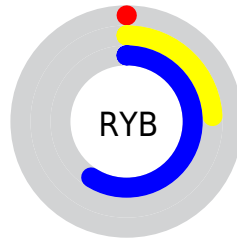
The RGB color **0, 100, 150** is a dark color, and the websafe version is hex **006699**. A complement of this color would be **150, 50, 0**, and the grayscale version is **76, 76, 76**.

A 20% lighter version of the original color is **83, 151, 204**, and **0, 54, 99** is the 20% darker color. If you saturate the color by 10%, you get **0, 100, 150**, and if you desaturate by 10%, it is **15, 105, 150**.

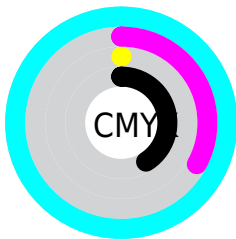

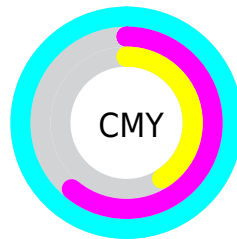

# Brightness & Saturation Gradients

These gradients show how the RGB color 0, 100, 150 changes by changing the brightness by 10 percent. The first figure shows a shift by +10% for each color and the second figure -10%.

Similar to the brightness gradients but the following saturation gradients show a change of the RGB color 0, 100, 150 by changing the saturation by 10% instead.

# Harmonies

## Analogous

The Analogous color harmony consists of three colors that are next to each other on the color wheel.

# Triad

The Triadic color harmony groups three colors that are evenly spaced from another and form a triangle on the color wheel.

# Complementary

The Complementary color scheme is a pair of colors which are on the opposite of each other on the color wheel.

# Split Complementary

Split-complementary colors differ from the complementary color scheme. The scheme consists of three colors, the original color and two neighbors of the complement color.

# Square

The Square scheme is like the rectangle color scheme, but the four colors are evenly spaced on the color wheel.

# Rectangle

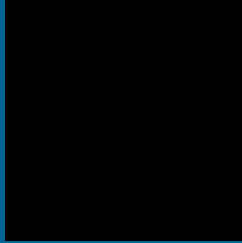

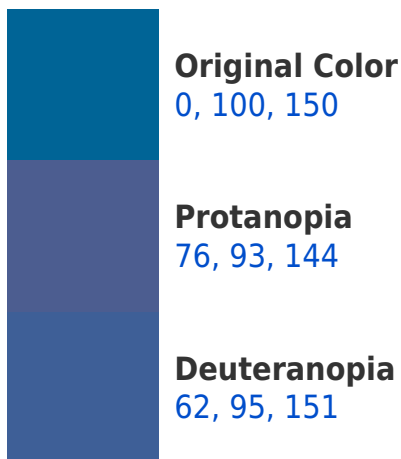


This preview shows how white text looks on a background with the RGB color 0, 100, 150.

# CSS Examples

## Text

The CSS property to change the color of the text to RGB 0, 100, 150 is called "color". The color property can be set on classes, ids or directly on the HTML element.

This example shows how text in the color `rgb(0, 100, 150)` looks like.

```
.text, #text, p{  
    color:rgb(0, 100, 150)  
}
```

If you want to add a text shadow in that color use the text-shadow property, you can generate a text shadow directly with our [CSS Text Shadow Generator](#).

Here you see how black text with a 4 pixel rgb(0, 100, 150) colored shadow looks like.

```
.shadow{ text-shadow: 4px 4px 2px rgb(0, 100, 150) }
```

## Border

The CSS property to change the border of an element to RGB 0, 100, 150 is called "border". The border property can be set on classes, ids or directly on the HTML element.

This example shows the color as border, it can be applied via the CSS property "border" or "border-color".

```
.border, #border, table{ border:4px solid rgb(0, 100, 150) }
```

If only the border color should be changed use the property `border-color`.

```
.border{ border-color:rgb(0, 100, 150) }
```

If you want to add a box shadow in that color use:

Here you see how a box with a 4 pixel `rgb(0, 100, 150)` colored shadow looks like.

```
.boxshadow{ -moz-box-shadow:4px 4px 4px  
4px rgb(0, 100, 150); -webkit-box-  
shadow:4px 4px 4px 4px rgb(0, 100, 150);  
box-shadow:4px 4px 4px 4px rgb(0, 100,  
150) }
```

# Background

The CSS property to change the background color of an element to RGB 0, 100, 150 is called "background". The background property can be set on classes, ids or directly on the HTML element.

```
.background, #background, body{  
background: rgb(0, 100, 150) }
```

If only the background color should be changed can be used:

```
.background{ background-color: rgb(0, 100,  
150) }
```

This example shows the color as background, it is applied via the CSS property "background".
